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As South Africa continues to test her citizens for COVID-19, the number of positive cases are increasing and so are the number of deaths. The virus is out there and will still be for quite some time. This tells us that, we are not going back to "the old normal" just yet. MaxProf will continue helping those affected by the pandemic. Since our last issue, MaxProf has supported even more municipalities.

We have assisted Northern Cape's John Taolo Gaetsewe District Municipality with medical supplies to the value of R 28,200.00 and the Greater Sekhukhune District Municipality where we spent over R 156,000.00 on food parcels for 147 families. MaxProf assisted Amathole District Municipality where more than R 60,000.00 was spent on food parcels and toiletries towards 3 centres catering for approximately 189 beneficiaries. We also visited the communities of Mahikeng Local Municipality where we spent more than R 141,000.00 on food parcels, masks and sanitizers for 3 centres benefiting over 130 beneficiaries. R19,992.70 was used to assist Big Five Hlabisa Local Municipality to buy much needed groceries for the community.

We celebrated National Youth Day with 4 schools where sanitizers, masks and non-perishable food items were handed out. July quickly arrived and we continued supporting the needy communities. This time we sponsored food parcels and Living Ball balls to a community in Cullinan. Last but not least, we celebrated our father, an international icon, Nelson Mandela, by giving out food parcels, clothing, personal protective equipment, sanitizers, dignitary packs and many more items to 6 centres based in the Tshwane Municipality region.

With so many people requesting food parcels, we first had to do our homework by doing some research on the initiative and the municipality. During this process, it was interesting to learn that this municipality's vision is, "being a leader in integrated economic development and sustainable service delivery". This provided guidance on the culture of the municipality and made us believe that we could trust and depend on the municipality to follow through with this task and execute it diligently. # MAHIKENG LOCAL MUNICIPALITY COVID 19 SUPPORT

On 10 June 2020, MaxProf arrived at Mahikeng Local Municipality, where after we proceeded to a local retail shop to collect food hampers that were requested by the Municipality for Lonely Park Signal Hill Disability Project, Oratile Semunza Disability Centre, Kgaratlho Project for the Blind and Feel at Home Disability Project. Even though it was windy and very cold, it could not deter the team, we were there to make an impact, we were there to change lives for the better.

Each centre and the individuals from the centre received hampers that included much-needed basic food items, toiletries, sanitizers and masks. These centres cater for people living with disabilities, the individuals at the centres are the vulnerable members of the Mahikeng Local Municipality community. We were excited that we could reach out to over 130 families through this initiative. It was also important for us to acknowledge that we could not do so without the assistance of the Mahikeng Local Municipality's team who identified the centres that needs our help.

Feel at Home Disability Project opened its doors in 2009 to people living with disabilities in and around Montshiwa Village. The founder, MeJosephine, saw that a lot of people were at home doing nothing and decided to approach their families requesting them to allow them to come to the centre and use their time wisely. The centre teaches them to sew, read, write and do artwork.

Lonely Park Signal Hill Disabled Project is an NPO in Mafikeng at Lonely Park Village, catering for persons living with disabilities from Lonely Park, Signal Hill and Top Village. The centre was founded in 2001 with 50 beneficiaries, having different disabilities. These individuals were recruited by the founders Ms. Poenyane Kenalemang (Chairperson), Ms. Kgole Kgomotso (Deputy Chairperson) and Ms. Gavrilovic Cathrine (Treasurer).

Due to the many people living with disabilities in the area that are not being cared for, left home alone and not engaged in community activities, one of the founders opened their garage to these special people. The centre's area of interest includes social services, services for the handicapped, including skills development, with the hope of creating employment which will generate income to sustain both the project and the beneficiaries. The centre currently caters for 40 beneficiaries from 8am to 5pm daily, they keep busy with crafts such as sewing, screen printing and beads work. The beneficiaries are also taught empowerment rights and responsibilities, health education and basic education (reading, writing and colouring).

The main objective for this project is to assist people living with disabilities to become independent. The age groups at this centre range between 2 and 59 years of age.

Oratile Semunza Disability Centre is a Non-profit Organization ("NPO") that was established in 2014 as a day care centre, taking care of 8 beneficiaries. It provides care and support to individuals living with mental health challenges, ranging between 8 and 45 years of age. The founder established the centre because she has a son living with Down's Syndrome. Within a space of a year, the centre grew into a residential facility due to the plight of the parents of the beneficiaries. The beneficiaries come from as far as Makgobistad, Disaneng, Ottoshoop, Madibogo, Makouspan, Kraaipan, Itsoseng and other areas around Mahikeng.

To date, the centre caters for 30 beneficiaries residing at the centre and 10 who commute daily. The beneficiaries are taken care of by 8 volunteer staff members whose main objectives are as follows:

- 1) Take care and support people living with mental disabilities,
- Skills development according to their potential/ abilities,
- Assist parents with children living with disabilities so they can be able to go to work, and
- 4) Empower youth with mental disabilities to acquire skills so that they can be employable.

The Kgaratlho Project for the Blind is an NPO established in 2005 with the objective to reach and assist the blind and partially sighted individuals from the North West. The centre currently caters for 40 beneficiaries with ages ranging between 26 and 74 years. The Project works closely with the South African National Council for the Blind. A lot of the blind and partially sighted people from the area were not taken care of by their families, missing out on community activities.

As part of their socio-economic empowerment, the centre assists its beneficiaries to develop skills which they can use to generate and earn income, and alleviate poverty in the community. The centre has a workshop, and this allows them to contribute to the local economy with their products such as bead work, manufacturing of detergents, cane work and other paralympic games materials (goal ball). The centre also teaches Braille and specialized computer training to its members thereby allowing them to access information on current and local issues e.g. HIV / AIDS, etc.

## MAXPROF ASSISTS LEARNERS WITH PPE ON NATIONAL YOUTH DAY

When President Cyril Ramaphosa announced that schools were to re-open on 8 June 2020, it highlighted the importance of the COVID-19 readiness of schools in preparation for the learners' return. Although the Department of Education provided public schools with COVID-19 items such as sanitizers and masks, more can still be done to ensure that our children are safe at school.

In commemoration of the 16 June 1976 Soweto Youth Uprising, for inclusion into a standardised and unbiased education system, MaxProf wanted to contribute to schools which represented our rainbow nation. The significance of this approach was to diversify the MaxProf CSR reach and serve children of all races. To achieve this, we contacted the District Head of Education, Ms. Martha Chisale, to provide MaxProf with a list of multi-racial schools in the Pretoria area which required a helping hand. Ms. Chisale highlighted Laerskool Booysens in the Pretoria Central area with approximately 160 pupils. We then did further research and identified HTS Pretoria Tuine (68 students) close by and Fleur Primary School in Centurion (approximately 160 students) who were also accepting donations.

While adhering to the COVID-19 regulations and procedures, the MaxProf team set out on Monday, 15 June 2020 to deliver the COVID-19 packs to the selected schools. Each school received a 25l container of sanitizer, protective three-layer face masks for pupils and stationery packs (with pencils, pens, erasers, rulers and glue). One particularly heart-warming request came from Ms. Linda Nell, Principal at Laerskool Booysens. Ms. Nell requested a donation in lieu of the school's feeding scheme in the form of tinned fish. She explained that she only had samp left over after assisting the children's families with food during the lockdown period and that she only required a few tins to feed her pupils for the week. Heartbroken by the news, MaxProf offered to purchase a month's worth of tinned fish which Ms. Nell explained was a favourite amongst her pupils. "We have a long queue for meals when the ladies are serving fish-and-samp for lunch", she said.

The genuine gratitude expressed by Principal Nell (Laerskool Booysens), Mr. Jacobs (Fleur Primary School) and Mr. Du Plessis (HTS Pretoria-Tuine) was heart-warming and motivates MaxProf to do even more in the coming months. It is a particularly tough time for matriculants who wish to obtain good marks that will enable them to further their tertiary education.

## IN HONOUR OF MANDELA DAY 2020, MAXPROF SUPPORTS CENTRES FOR VICTIMS OF GENDER BASED VIOLENCE

Nelson Mandela International Day is an annual international day in honour of Nelson Mandela, celebrated each year on 18 July, former President Nelson Mandela's birthday. The day was officially declared by the United Nations ("UN") in November 2009, with the first UN Mandela Day held on 18 July 2010.

Even though the special day allocated as Mandela Day, is 18 July, South Africans, and yes, also MaxProf, embrace the chance to celebrate Nelson Mandela's life for the whole of July.

In May, the ENCA reported that since the start of the national lockdown period on 27 March 2020, more than 120 000 victims contacted the domestic abuse hotline. President Cyril Ramaphosa also announced on 17 June 2020 that R 1.6 billion would be dedicated to sourcing solutions to assist South Africa's second pandemic - the abuse and murder of women and children. Femicide in South Africa has recently been a magnified issue, and we believe that the issue needs to be attended to at every possible level. No matter how small your action, Mandela Day is all about changing the world for the better, just as Nelson Mandela did every day. We at MaxProf did our part by acting and responded to the societal issue at hand. We contacted the Gauteng Department of Social Development which provided us with a list of relevant homes and centres that cater specifically for those who have been affected by abuse. This led us to Mercy House, Beth Shan Shelter, Mali Martin Polokegong Centre, The Potter House, Youth for Survival and the Re-Bafenyi Victim Empowerment centres which are based in Pretoria Central. Pretoria West and the Cullinan and Bronkhorstspruit areas. These establishments provide sanctuaries for women and children who have been the victims of abuse.

MaxProf donated groceries, masks, sanitizers, blankets, nappies and other baby essentials, toys and clothing to the centres for victims of gender based violence.
